The Soil Conservation Act of 1935 was signed into law by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in response to the Dust Bowl of the 1930s. Soil and Water Conservation Districts were created in every state. They established land management practices that have lasted for generations.

The Wake Soil and Water Conservation District is a non-regulatory agency that works every day to conserve soil, water, air and wildlife. The Board of Supervisors works closely with the staff to provide the citizens:

- Planning and implementation for erosion control
- Education in ecology and natural resource management
- Wildlife habitat improvement
- Technical assistance with wetland issues and wetland restoration

Wake District 2010-2011 Achievements


- Prevented 26,371 tons of sediment from reaching lakes and streams
- Enrolled over 5,800 acres in the Voluntary Agricultural District Program
- Installed 544,948 sq. feet of conservation practices in non-agricultural areas
- Assisted 5,465 homeowners with erosion control and drainage problems
- Coordinated 1,102 volunteers for Big Sweep Wake County
